Bronze Praise offers the handbell soloist the opportunity to ring contemporary songs, using a variety of techniques from a bell tree to mallets and multiple bells-in-hand. The difficulty level depends on the performance tempo. The same solo may be rung in a slower, meditative mood, or with an upbeat, peppy attitude. Always follow the rules for smooth, flowing solo ringing, paying special attention to communicate the words and meaning of the song.

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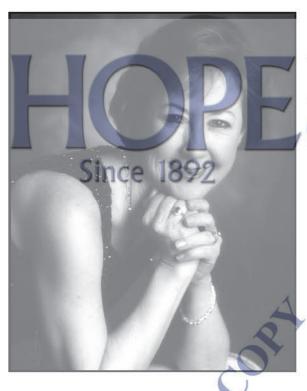




Cathy DeRousse received the Bachelor of Music degree in church music from Oklahoma Baptist University and the Master of Music

In 1984 she founded, and continues to ring in, Medallion Ringers, a professional 4-in-hand quartet.

Anderson, professor of science at The Master's College and the Institute for Creation Research, teacher/lecturer on the creation/evolution issue. In addition to handbells Christine enjoys reading, counted cross-stitching, knitting, sewing, baking pies, skiing, and hiking.

Solo Ringing Suggestions

The goal of solo ringing is to achieve a smooth, flowing melody line following the natural rise and fall of the phrase. To ring as musically and gracefully as possible, follow these rules.

- 1. Lay out all bells from C5-C7 in keyboard order, in 2 separate rows; lower and higher bells should be added as needed. Keep bells in keyboard order except when moving a bell temporarily into a vacant space for a quicker reach.
- 2. Choreography for advanced ringers familiar with 2-in-hand techniques is indicated by ().
- 3. Glue each note to the next with no break between. A little LV into the next note is actually a good sound, used judiciously.
- 4. Never cross hands, as in step-wise motion. Learn to weave, pass a bell from one hand to the other, experiment with leading with one hand and then the other to avoid excessive passing. Crossing hand over arm is allowed as long as there is at least one bell between notes being rung, and legato is maintained.
- 5. Keep bells very close to the table when ringing quickly, but when the note value or tempo allows, raise the bell upright and keep bells in motion, using all the time and space a note value allows. Strive for economy of motion, with every motion having meaning.
- 6. Don't delay moving hands from one bell to the next. Think ahead.
- 7. Memorize both music and choreography, and ring from the heart. Communicate the meaning of the music.
- 8. Adjust handbells to ring easily and not backring. Voice bells to match each other in timbre and volume.
- 9. Make your table set-up and personal appearance pleasing to the audience.
- 10. Shoulder/waist damping is reserved for bells to be rung again; damp all other bells on the table. Pinger damping makes a graceful alternative to body damping.
- 11. Practice, practice, practice!

r, l right hand, left hand; start with hand indicated, alternating hands until a change is noted.

r-l, l-r = ring bell in first hand, pass to other hand without damping.

s = shoulder damp, waist damp, finger damp; all other bells damp at the table.

R = normal ring and damp note values.

() = optional 2-in-hand or shelley.

\\ = shelley, right hand; // = shelley, left hand.

\ = 2-in-hand, right; /= 2-in-hand, left.

 E_b F_{\sharp} = place D in the space between E_b and F_{\sharp} .

X = return bells to normal position on the table.

= mallet roll.

Salute = raise bell(s) straight up in the air.

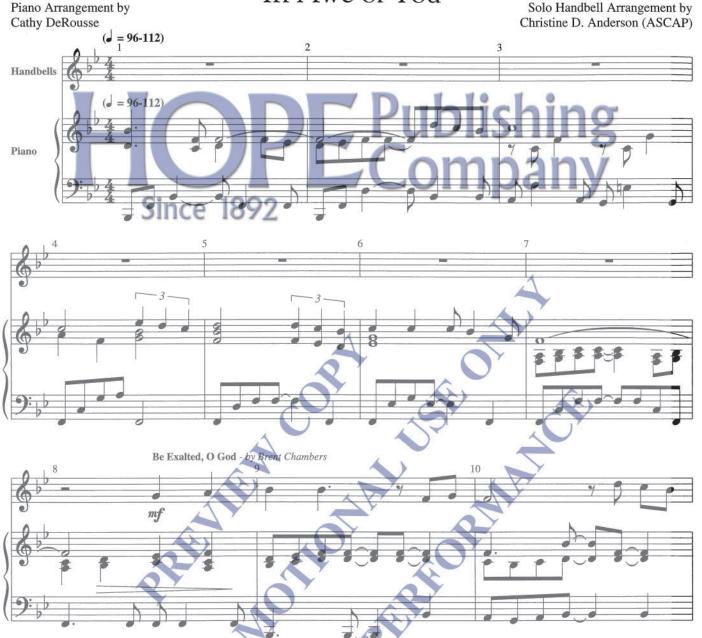
GTT = Gentle Table Touch: lower bell(s) slowly to table, casting(s) almost touching, until ready for final cut-off/damp.

PhD = Phanny Damp: slowly lower bell(s) down to your side and behind your back to damp on phanny.

= Gyro: ring bell, then rotate wrist in a flat circular plane.
