

Performance Notes

Rockwood River is a “neo folk song” in the style of classic folk songs which celebrate a simpler time and place. In the world of Rockwood River, time is slow and life is easy. As you perform the piece, keep in mind the carefree attitude that goes along with the text, breezy melody, and “hoedown” style. Think Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn. In other words...have fun! If you do, so will the audience.

The text paints a picture of a day at Rockwood River, so work hard to articulate the words and communicate the message clearly. When singing the word “fritter”*, make sure you sing on the vowel and not the “r” consonant as you hold the phrase out. The sudden dynamic change to piano in measure 86 is important as it sets up “the big finish” when the chorus sings the final augmented phrase at *forte*. The final “Yee-haw” should be controlled, but joyful!

If possible, memorize the piece to allow yourself full freedom for the (optional) body percussion. It is highly encouraged to add the (optional) fiddle and string bass accompaniment as they embellish the celebrative nature of the piece (as does the optional tambourine beginning at measure 73).

Above all, remember the message of the piece...and that’s to take time to celebrate the joy of life and its simple pleasures.

**To “fritter” time away means to squander or waste it...a good thing, actually, when one is having fun at Rockwood River!*
