




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#### **Performance Notes**

*Break, Break, Break* was written in 1835 by Alfred Lord Tennyson, (1809-1892), one of England's most popular poets. An elegy for a friend, the poem portrays the sea as life – remorselessly moving on.

This setting begins with the crashing of the sea against the rocky crags, dramatically introduced in the piano accompaniment. The swelling dynamics, from piano to forte to piano, represent the swelling of the sea and the feelings of loss conveyed by the poet.

Singers should strive for intentional dynamic contrast to effectively convey the meaning of the text. Additionally, when singing the word "break", roll the 'r' and emphasize the 'k' for a more percussive, "crashing" quality.

The middle section, mm. 20-52, should be calmer in character. There are, however, occasional swellings which remind us that the sea is still in motion, even while we are remembering friends that have moved on.

I hope you enjoy learning, singing and performing this song as much as I enjoyed writing it!
